SJCS Recognizes the Honorable Mary Raether with the Pillow Lee Award

On February 20, 2008, St. John's Community Services (SJCS) presented the Honorable Mary M. Raether with the 21st Annual Pillow Lee Award, which recognizes a staff or board member who has shown long-term dedication to our mission, people with disabilities, and the courage to champion our cause. The ceremony—hosted by Reverend Luis León, St. John's Rector, and Mark Gold, Chairman of the SJCS Board of Trustees—was held at the historic St. John's Episcopal Church where our legacy began nearly 140 years ago. In attendance were St. John's staff, Board members, volunteers, service recipients and their families, supporters and special guests, and Mary's family members and friends.

The ceremony was a moving reminder of the rich history of our agency and pioneering role advocating for and with people living with disabilities. Reverend León welcomed guests to the "Church of the Presidents," recognizing the special relationship with St. John's Community Services. Mark Gold described Mrs. Frederick B. (Pillow) Lee, for whom the award was named, as a woman of the next millennium and an example to us all. Merrieliou Symes, President of the Founders Board, described the Church as the cornerstone for SJCS and the legacy of the Ladies Aid Society living on today as the Founders Board. Genni Sasnett, SJCS Chief Operating Officer, highlighted the agency today, with expanding service opportunities and ongoing advocacy.

Tom Wilds, SJCS President, and Thalia Simpson-Clement, SJCS-VA State Director, presented Mary with the Pillow Lee Award. They spoke of her support to St. John's for nearly twenty-five years, during times of dramatic challenges. Mary was part of the process that resulted in the change of the agency's name and mission, expansion into other states and its diversification of service.

Mary served St. John's Community Services as a member and later Chair of the SJCS Virginia Board of Directors, as an officer and longstanding member of the SJCS Board of Trustees, and currently as a Sustaining Member of the Founders Board. Professionally, Mary served for ten years as a legislative assistant to George H.W. Bush and Barber B. Conable, Jr. She was also one of fifteen Presidential appointees to serve on the National Council on Disability (NCD). Mary served NCD with distinction as Chair of the Education Committee and member of the Executive Committee, advising the President and Congress on the Americans with Disabilities Act and other major legislation.

In receiving the Award, Mary shared her personal feelings on the joy and privilege of belonging to St. John's Community Services, stemming from being an active parishioner and volunteer with the Church. Mary expressed her ongoing commitment to making sure that the civil rights of people with disabilities are upheld.

Mrs. Lee was honored as the first recipient of the award for her long dedication to SJCS as a member of the Ladies' Board and the Board of Trustees. At a time of change and uncertainty, Mrs. Lee spearheaded the transformation of the agency from its origins as an orphanage into the first community-based alternative to the institutionalization of children with intellectual disabilities. Thus, the Pillow Lee Award was created in her honor in 1987 as a symbol of gratitude to those who have followed in her footsteps. Congratulations to the Honorable Mary M. Raether for carrying on this tradition of dedicated and courageous service.

Is this all too much to reach for at our 140th Anniversary? I think not. It represents but another pivotal point in time for St. John's Community Services. Our commitment to *Drive Social Change*, to create inclusive communities for people of all abilities, will guide us for yet another 140 years.

It's St. John's Community Services 140th Anniversary! I am increasingly reflecting upon our journey through time—where we've been, how far we've come, and how much lies ahead for us to accomplish. Central to the journey are the people we support, their stories, and the drive for social change so that the human rights of people with diverse abilities are protected and advanced.

I am touched the most by the lives of people with disabilities living and participating in the communities of their choosing because of St. John's Community Services. The range and diversity of their lives, their smiles, and their self-esteem is in stark contrast to the horrible institutional life that many faced not long ago before joining the St. John's family.

140th Fall Event Planning Underway

This is a dynamic time for St. John's Community Services, with the planning of events, new products and services in anticipation of our 140th Anniversary year celebration. The fall of 2008 is shaping up to be an exciting culmination of a year of notable events.

SJCS will present an extraordinary 140th Anniversary event on Thursday, November 6, 2008, including Grammy Award winning musicians in concert at Constitution Hall. The concert will be the centerpiece of a celebratory evening and weekend of other activities. This special celebration will be a time to honor people of all abilities and organizations providing support so that people can live fully within communities of their choice. Another exciting element of the event will be the premier of a new SJCS DVD

profiling individuals in their communities and chronicling our agency's historic roots and advocacy efforts.

As announced previously, ARTview 2008 was to be the opening night beneficiary of artDC, scheduled to be held at the Washington Convention Center on May 15. Unfortunately, artDC has since cancelled its show. At this time, SJCS is considering other options to continue the tradition of artists with and without disabilities at ARTview 2008.

Thus far, the year has been marked by a Kick-Off Reception at the Willard Hotel (see Winter 2007 Community Connections), SJCS state award ceremonies and city proclamations, Pillow Lee Award (see page 1), and the Founders Board Spring Reception hosted by Taiwan at

Twin Oaks (see Founders Board, page 4). The fall will not only represent a celebration of accomplishments, but serve as a launch into the next 140 years of support to our communities.

Arthur Ginsberg, SJCS-DC State Director, will become the Chief Government Affairs and Advocacy Officer, while continuing to serve as the DC State Director. In the two years that Arthur has led St. John's operations in the District of Columbia, SJCS-DC has emerged from a deficit situation to one of stability and growth. The SJCS-DC team has done an outstanding job. In his new position, Arthur will work closely with State Directors to build relationships with key government constituents, to identify legislative activities having an impact on the provider community, and to develop an advocacy plan targeting state and local governments.

Nicole Buckley, SJCS Research Associate for our Department of Evaluation and Planning, has assumed responsibility as the new State Director for Pennsylvania. Nicole comes to SJCS-PA after a number of years with SJCS, including the position of Program Director in the state of New Jersey. Nicole will apply her considerable talents to oversee the anticipated growth and expansion of services in Pennsylvania.

The Founders Board of St. John's Community Services

We wish to acknowledge once again the extraordinary support of St. John's Community Services provided by the ladies of the Founders Board. The St. John's Founders Board (originally the Ladies Aid Society) has been a constant presence throughout the 140-year history of SJCS. Their mission has been to raise funds for the ongoing support of children, and later adults, cared for by St. John's Hospital for Children, the Church Orphanage of St. John's Parish, St. John's Child Development Center and now St. John's Community Services.

In 1884, the Ladies Aid Society held a 4-day Fair at "Willard's Hall" (to become the historic Willard Hotel), raising over \$2,400. In 1901, the Ladies Aid hosted the first garden party to benefit the Orphanage, beginning a tradition that continues today with a different embassy each year hosting an annual garden party to raise funds to support SJCS services for children and women in Washington, DC.

In 1957, after the closing of the Orphanage, a committee chaired by Mrs. Frederick B. (Pillow) Lee, a

member of the Founders Board, compiled a report, *Looking into the Needs for Children*. The Report underscored the distress among parents who had committed their children to Forest Haven, the District's notorious institution for people with intellectual disabilities, because of the lack of day services to provide training and care for them. As a result, St. John's Child Developmental Center was established as an independent, private educational organization for children with intellectual disabilities.

Throughout this transition and evolution to a multi-state human services organization, the Founders Board has been working steadfastly to ensure that the work of St. John's goes on. In addition to the annual Spring Garden Party, the Founders Board and other members of the Thrift Shop Charities have hosted an annual Antique Show to raise funds. Today, the Founders Board of St. John's Community Services remains the single largest donor of SJCS, raising over \$100,000 annually for St. John's services.

Have you considered ways you can

support the work of the Founders Board? In addition to your monetary contributions, there are other things you can do. For example, you might want to visit the Thrift Shop on P Street in Georgetown and browse for hidden treasures. Perhaps you would enjoy attending the Antique Show next January, or the next Spring Garden Party. These are easy but vital ways to expand the reach of the Founders Board's work in support of people with disabilities.
